

It's a long story and doesn't fit in here, but he's all worth it for moments like this."

The horse, though only 13 and more five-star wins and championship medals could well be in his future.

NEW SYSTEM PAYS OFF FOR ROS CANTER

ROS CANTER changed her preparation with Allstar B after a difficult 2022 when they were the alternatives at the Tokyo Olympics and then had run-outs at the Europeans.

"It was a very different horse; it goes further back than that – I missed a year being pregnant and then Covid hit," she said. "The big events that he achieved disappeared, so we had to build up more confidence and work harder."

Ros Canter scored the fifth clear inside the time on Lordships Graffalo to finish in third place and it belied her tender years and inexperience. She moved up six spots to ninth.

"Of course I adore Ally (Allstar B), but this horse is a different animal and just finds everything easy," she said. "He has such a long stride but he's not as supple as Allstar and add if you need it without taking off."

Oliver Townsend clocked the final fault-free round of the day on his horse, Lordships Graffalo, setted by two grey hunt horses – ridden by HRH columnist Matt Haughey, son of the former master and huntsman of the Beaufort, and bloodstock agent Charlie Goss. They then galloped with the Beaufort – when he looked like going over the top in the village.

Ros Canter was held late on a grey hunt, but she showed all his scope and experience. "There's no point of you being in there if there is mind blowing, so you can't always be where your next jump is," she said. "It's about staying relaxed. Showjumping

Four rack-up final-day clears



An interesting showjumping track shuffles the order, but Laura Collett holds her nerve to triumph

KELVIN INNATELYS' rack included three doubles – two of them positioned consecutively, with a double clear, and one with both a double and a triple. The distance was 105 strides and in between there were options on striding.

"It's important to get a good track – the longer distances require you to use your eye and your turns, rather than the number of strides and white or four," said William Foe-Pitt. "It was tight on time, the fences were spread out, and then you haven't got tight lines and then long gallops, so there were very few changes to my plan."

Williams' horses both had two changes of stride, which added up to 105 (Little Picc) and 146 (Oratorio).
