The Badminton runner-up lacks manners on the ground, but he's from a family who all perform at their best at events, as *Pippa Roome* finds out

RIDER ROS CANTER

*LORDSHIPS GRAFFALO [Walter] is out of the same mare, Cornish Queen, as another of ny rides, Pencos Crown Jewel. Breeder Pennie Wallace sold her as a foal to Kate James and Annie Makin, who went to the Burghley young event borse final to pick a rider for her and chose me. Because I had her, Pennie decided to send me Lordships Graffalo – who was bred while Cornish Queen was on loan to Lordships Stud – to be broken in.

"I loved him from the day I got him and he was always for sale, so I approached Michele Saul, who was looking for a young horse, and asked her if she'd consider buying him. "He's kind of untrainable on the ground.

"He's kind of untrainable on the ground. He'll rugby tackle you when you try to put the bridle on and he's not very good at social distancing. But he was easy to break in and never bothered about the rider. He was quite lazy to start with - he'd get completely left behind ambling along out hacking – but out of the blue he could buck or rear or do something funny.

"Walter really surprised us with his results last year, but that whole family are performers – I've ridden Lordships Parc Royale out of the same day, no – and they show their best work at a competition.

"I thought Walter was ready for Badminton, but I don't have loads of experience, plus because of Covid he hasn't had mileage at events such as Bramham, which you'd normally do before Badminton. But he'd made the four-stars he had done feel easy, so I had no reason not to take his

Yard second rider Georgie Frow

"WALTER is always causing entertainment – it's funny to watch if you're not trying to tack him up! He eats the tack, throws headcollars across the yard, tries to grab hold of brushes. If you leave him too long in the cross-ties, he'il dribble and throw it to see how far he can get his spit across the yard. The vet once parked outside his stable to see another horse and he licked her car clean. He's the joker and always has the last laugh.

"He's cuddly in the stable, especially when he's lying down. In the winter, when the horses are in more, he has an afternoon nap around 3pm each day.

"He's a beautiful horse to ride with a lovely mouth. When you take him hacking he wouldn't be bothered by a 20-tonne lorry, but he doesn't like flowers, especially purple ones. One day last winter, he went round a corner and just bronced. Then he stood there and looked at me as if to say. Why are you on the floor?"

BADMINTON JUDGE CHRISTIAN LANDOLT

"LORDSHIPS GRAFFALO has the most amazing attitude and good balance, which showed in all phases at Badminton.

In the dressage, he worked in a nice frame, to a nice contact. There were occasionally blips in his work, because he's young and green, but you don't sanction those minor things harshly because you know the horse is working in the right direction.

"He doesn't immediately strike you as a superstar, but the more you look at him, the more you like him. He makes you feel good as a judge – the sort of horse where the way he works puts a smile on your face and puts you at ease. With some horses, you get a knot in your stomach wondering what's going to happen next, but not him.

"Lordships Graffalo looks happy, willing and genuine, which showed the whole week long. Everything we saw in the dressage carried through to the jumping phases. He didn't seem fazed by any of the tests but flew through the whole week with a smile on his face, trying his best, which was charming to see." H&H
